MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



Happy Fall Neighbors!

This Summer went by VERY fast! At the City, your leadership has been moving nonstop to make sure that we continue to

provide you with un-rivaled services! First up is the budget update!

Castle Hills Budget

This is always a difficult season for the City. All the departments come forward with their needs and wants. It us up to City Manager and Council to sift through that and determine what we can do with what we can afford. This budget season has been extra difficult due to a couple of other reasons. Primarily, the property values across Bexar County are slightly down this year. As property values go down, that means that we have less dollars to provide services. Make no mistake that your investment in your home in Castle Hills is safe as we are seeing fluctuations across the entire County. The other variable that is outside of our hands is healthcare insurance for City staff, which many of us have seen increases personally.

Council's objective has been to manage these adjustments with minimal impact, to you the resident. We are in a very fortunate place where we have made SUBSTANTIAL improvements all over the City before this point. The good news is that there is less expected small spending on streets and drainage because much of the improvements were completed with the borrowed dollars. That means that there will be less, surprise repairs and instead a regular loan repayment amount. The plus side is that you the resident get to see those benefits now.

Infrastructure Projects

Speaking of benefits, the good news is that we are already seeing return on our investment from the Carolwood Drainage project. The first weekend in September we had some steady rain and the system handled the water with ease, keeping all stormwater runoff underground. We will expect to see substantial completion on target with our estimated completion date of December 2025.

Some residents have asked about the process of restoring their front yards. Please know that we will not start restoration until the project is almost 100% done. This is designed so that we can avoid double work and leave your front yard how we found it. Once we get to that point, if you have any discrepancies please let know. Our hope is to make sure that homeowners are satisfied before we closeout the project.



Speaking of satisfaction, the City Manager and I were invited out to the Greater Harmony Hills Neighborhood Association meeting to share information about the drainage project. Councilwoman Dr. Sukh Kaur was present and we ran into our friend, former San Antonio Councilman and current Bexar County Judge Cruz Shaw at the association meeting

The meeting was extremely productive. There was originally some misunderstanding amongst some San Antonio residents that the drainage project only benefited Castle Hills residents. As many of you all know, that is far from the truth, the project was designed to increase safety for anyone that drives on Lockhill Selma. In full transparency the conversation did raise some questions and concerns amongst San Antonio residents with respect the detention pond across Lockhill Selma.

Through conversations the City of San Antonio asked if Castle Hills would be amenable to discussing some small changes for the pond. As a financial partner and neighbor, we said that we welcome a discussion. While these changes may delay pond completion, our objective is to make certain that any changes come at no financial impact to Castle Hills, that it does not delay the completion of the portion in Castle Hills, and that it doesn't negatively impact the systems operation. We have shared our concerns, and we

believe that we are all on the same page.

For a project that many believed would be impossible due to the coordination and project cost, thank you for your support, trust, patience, and grace as we've worked to address this issue that has plagued the City of Castle Hills for nearly 20 years. Thank you to City of San Antonio and Councilwoman Dr. Sukh Kaur for being such great partners on this project.

We still have some work to go on the Manton project and drawings are nearly finalized for Krameria and Mimosa. Krameria and Mimosa will likely go out to bid in the Fall and we can slate a contractor to start in the beginning of the year.

HALT System

We have talked about the HALT system for a while now, it is with great pride to share that the units are now active! We met onsite with all Castle Hills Public Works, Police, and Fire, Bexar County, and the testing engineer. The systems work and they are now officially reporting to www.Bexarflood.org. You can go on their website and setup an alert to notify you if those crossings get to an unsafe point. This is especially helpful for first responders, going forward dispatch will be notified. If necessary, Castle Hills first responders or public works can put out barricades.

As previously mentioned, this has been in the works for nearly 4 years. Former City Manager Rapelye and myself met with Former County Commissioner Trish DeBerry. This has had continued support of County Commissioner Grant Moody and the entire Commissioner's court. Since this started, we have gone through the grant process through the Texas Division of Emergency Management. What we have now is 2 high water crossing signs that have built in smart technology at no cost to Castle Hills taxpayers.



Code Enforcement

While we have made extraordinary progress on all things infrastructure, signage, branding, and the improvements at the Commons; one area that we continue to receive feedback on is Code Enforcement. Let's start by agreeing that Code Enforcement requires some attention. Now that are almost past budget, we will be focusing our sights on overhauling how Castle Hills does code enforcement.

From what you the residents have shared; it isn't always clear what your code issue is or what your options are once you receive a notice. The hope here is to have the violations clearly identify the issue, let you know what your options are, and let you know what next steps could be going forward.

It is personal belief that Code Enforcement isn't about fining residents but rather serving as a gentle reminder about issues around our properties that we need to address. There should also be a reasonable amount of time for you the resident to find a professional to address the issue or wait till you have a day off work if you chose to do it yourself. For some properties that refuse to comply, the City will be exploring

additional options. In some cases if there is no compliance, the City will address the issue and assess a fee to the owner of the property. There is no reason for our community to have to endure living next to a problem property.

Please keep in mind that all changes must be balanced by what we can legally do as a City. The State is extremely prescriptive in detailing certain components of the code enforcement process. Our objective is following that process but to provide more transparency for a more resident-centric experience. Most code compliance issues are resident generated and we are doing our best to investigate and process all paperwork. You are always welcomed to anonymously report issues for our Code Officer to investigate through the website.

Lastly, with cooler weather approaching, we hope to see you out in the Commons for upcoming events. One of the fastest approaching outings is National Night Out on October 7th. If you are unfamiliar with NNO, people all over the City will host block parties in their front yard. This is an opportunity to get out and meet your neighbors in your immediate area. Please keep an eye on social media to find out which of your neighbors are having gatherings. As always, please let us know how we can be of service.

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MESSAGE FROM THE CITY MANAGER

Hello Castle Hills! ~ ¡Hola Castle Hills!

In June, the City began the fiscal year 2025-2026 budget process (budget year starts on October 1st and ends the following September 30th). Several budget workshops have been held since then. Adoption of the FY 2025-2026 budget is scheduled for Tuesday, September 9th; adoption of the tax rate is also scheduled for the same day.

The proposed FY 25-26 budget totals \$10,910,224 across all funds and is designed to address several identified budgetary issues. The proposed General Fund budget is designed to reduce the fund balance by \$41,129 so expenditures exceed revenue by this amount. The General Fund revenues for the Fiscal Year 2025-2026 total \$8,531,789, an increase of \$168,070 or 2.01% from the adopted FY 2024-2025 total budgeted revenues. The revenue increase is property taxes, court income, and the garbage fee; the majority of other revenue line-items are static or have decreases. The General Fund total appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2025-2026 are \$8,572,918, an increase of \$205,699 or 2.46% from the adopted FY 24-25 General Fund total appropriations. The increases include salary and benefit cost increases, insured property insurance premiums, repairs to the Fire Station, etc.; inflation continues to impact the City’s operating costs.

Due to the cost increase in providing garbage service, it is necessary to adjust the garbage fee effective November 1st. The garbage fee was increased by \$3.50 (\$27.50 to \$31.00). Over the past four fiscal years (started in FY 20-21), the operational costs of the garbage service have exceeded the revenue, and the funding gap has widened every year since. Landfill costs and other operating costs have increased, but the greatest issue is staffing. The City has relied on contract labor for the past several years in Public Works; this expense is creating much of the budgetary issue. Employees with CDLs are in high demand area-wide, and the City has struggled to hire and retain these employees. Greater efforts will be made this fiscal year to fully staff the Public Works Department to resolve this contract labor issue.

The proposed budget is based on utilization of the voter-approval tax rate of \$0.578846 per \$100 assessed taxable value. The property tax rate is comprised of two components: 1) maintenance and operations and 2) interest and sinking fund (debt service). The proposed M&O tax rate is \$0.515500 and the proposed I&S tax rate is \$0.063346 for a combined total of \$0.578846 per \$100 assessed taxable value. The current tax rate is \$0.540661 per \$100 assessed taxable value. Utilization of the voter-approval tax rate was necessary due to the budgetary issues identified by the budget officer.

In 2019, the State Legislature approved Senate Bill 2 that

made significant changes to property taxes. Previously, the City discussed adopting a tax rate between the “effective tax rate” (the benchmark tax rate needed to raise the same amount of maintenance and operations property taxes on existing property as the previous year after taking into account changes in appraised values) and the “rollback tax rate” (the tax rate necessary to raise precisely 8% more maintenance and operations tax revenue as the year before after taking into account appraisal fluctuations). Following SB2, the term “effective tax rate” has been changed to “no-new-revenue tax rate” and “rollback tax rate” has been changed to “voter-approval tax rate.” The “voter-approval tax rate” is calculated utilizing 3.5% instead of eight percent. Based upon information received from the Bexar County Appraisal District, the City’s certified taxable values from \$917,451,304 to \$892,834,946, a decrease of \$24,616,358 or 2.68%. Tax rates and property values have an inverse relationship; when one decreases, the other increases.

Capital projects included in the proposed budget include street improvements (\$550,000 allocated), the purchase of a new garbage truck, starting a five-year program to replace the self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) for the Fire Department, the bathroom/shower area remodeling of the Fire Station, and the implementation of a new in-car camera system for the Police Department.

Please save the date for several scheduled community events including NATIONAL NIGHT OUT on Tuesday, October 7th, TRUNK-OR-TREAT on Saturday, October 25th (at Castle Hills Elementary School and the Commons), and LIGHTING OF THE LIGHTS on Sunday, November 30th (at the Commons).

Finally, on September 1st, we celebrated Labor Day – an annual celebration of the achievements of the American workers. I want to thank and recognize the employees of the City of Castle Hills; the men and women of this organization have done an amazing job in their performance of their duties and have shown a deep dedication for this community. THANK YOU. And thank you to all workers!

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Cooking and heating are the leading causes of home fires and fire injuries, and winter months are the peak time for fire-related incidents.

Minimize Your Risks

When cooking, make fire safety a priority by keeping these tips in mind:

- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling or broiling food
- When simmering, baking or roasting, check the food regularly, remain in the kitchen while cooking and use a timer
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop

Heating is the second leading cause of home fires. Follow these tips:

- Keep all flammables, like paper, clothing, bedding, drapes or rugs, at least 3 feet from a space heater, stove or fireplace
- Never leave portable heaters and fireplaces unattended; turn off heaters and make sure fireplace embers are extinguished before leaving the room
- If you must use a space heater, place it on a level, nonflammable surface, like ceramic tile, not on a rug or carpet
- Keep children and pets away from space heaters
- When buying a space heater, look for models that shut off automatically if the heater falls over

Other precautions:

- Check all cords and replace any that are frayed or have bare wires
- Switch to flameless candles
- Keep matches and lighters high and out of children’s reach in a locked cabinet

Working Smoke Alarms Are a Must

About three out of five fire deaths happen in homes without working smoke alarms. Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan providing early warning to reduce your risk of dying in a fire. The National Fire Protection Association recommends you:

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas on the ceiling or high on the wall
- Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen, at least 10 feet from the stove, to reduce false alarms
- Test smoke alarms monthly
- Replace batteries in your smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector annually
- Replace smoke alarms that are 10 or more years old

Make an Escape Plan

One home structure fire is reported every 88 seconds, according to Injury Facts. Once the smoke alarm sounds, a fire can spread

quickly, leaving only a minute or two to escape. That’s why it’s so important to have a home escape plan. Start by drawing a map for your home and follow these guidelines:

- Plan two ways to escape from each room
- Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily
- Identify secondary routes: a window onto an adjacent roof or a collapsible ladder from a second floor window
- If you live in a multi-story building, plan to use the stairs – never the elevator
- Designate an outside meeting place a safe distance from the house

Practice Your Plan

- Practice getting out with eyes closed, crawling low to the floor and keeping your mouth covered
- Practice closing doors behind you
- Practice how to “stop, drop and roll” if your clothes catch on fire
- Practice testing door handles to see if they are hot before opening them
- Teach children never to hide and how to escape on their own in case you can’t help them

When and How to Use Fire Extinguisher

Always put your safety first; if you are not confident in your ability to use a fire extinguisher, get out and call 9-1-1. The American Red Cross cautions you to evaluate the situation and ensure:

- Everyone has left or is leaving the home
- The fire department has been called
- The fire is small, not spreading, and there is not much smoke
- Your back is to an exit you can use quickly

Remember the acronym PASS:

- Pull the pin.
- Aim low at the base of the fire.
- Squeeze the handle slowly.
- Sweep the nozzle side to side.

Carolwood & Manton Roadway & Drainage Improvements Project Update

(as of August 31, 2025)

CONTRACTOR: D PLATA CONSTRUCTION

PROJECT ENGINEER: ARDURRA GROUP, INC.

FUNDED BY: CITY OF CASTLE HILLS, CITY OF SAN ANTONIO, SAWS, AND BEXAR COUNTY

Progress Report:

- Contractor has begun the road work on Carolwood; a second coat of asphalt will be completed next week; the contractor will also work on the curbs and driveways on Carolwood;
- Contractor has completed the water main work on Lockhill-Selma and has nearly completed the sewer main work with testing still being conducted on the sewer main work;
- The full closure of Lockhill-Selma at Carolwood was scheduled for completion at the end of August; the contractor did not meet this milestone. The City has given direction to the contractor that the full closure of Lockhill-Selma at Carolwood needs to be ended as soon as possible; a partial re-opening while construction is not underway (after hours and on weekends) with proper safety signage, etc. has been suggested;
- The necessary work on the channel/pond area on the City of San Antonio property was ordered stopped by the City of San Antonio to allow for the re-design of the channel/pond area. The City of Castle Hills expressed the need to ensure there are no negative impacts from the re-design, namely no greater potential of water flowing across the street. The City of San Antonio will be paying for the re-design of the channel/pond area;
- The roadway work on Manton should begin in late September (weather-permitting). The roadway construction will take 2-3 months to complete;
- Substantial completion of the project remains scheduled for early January 2026; at this time, the additional work on the project due to the re-design of the channel/pond area would impact construction in the City of San Antonio with the work in Castle Hills completed by January 2026;
- Prior to closeout of the project, a punch-list will be completed; any damages to property due to construction would be addressed at that time; however, any damages should be reported as they occur to ensure proper documentation.
